Scotland's Colleges – the facts

- 43 colleges, located across Scotland, with campuses from Strangaer to Lerwick
- Over 390,000 students attended a college in 2007-08
- 38% of Scottish 17 year olds and 35% of 16 year olds attend a college
- 26% of college students come from Scotland's most deprived areas
- Part-time study accounts for 84% of enrolments
- Average age of students in Scotland is 30

Engineers of the Future

- Innovative five-year company sponsored programme
- Combination of practical skills, work experience and academic study
- Employed status for students from leaving school and leading to job on successful completion.

Skillzone

- The Angus College 'Skillzone' is a specialised unit working with young students, many of whom have complex learning needs and chaotic lifestyles
- Main focus is employability skills evidenced through nationally recognised City and Guilds qualifications
- Encompasses community projects, volunteering, supporting others and work placements
- 48 week programme can be started at any time.



Skillzone

- In addition, involvement of an independent educational psychologist provides detailed evidence of 'distance travelled' by students.
- 07-08: Positive Student Outcome 86.4%
- 08-09: Positive Student Outcome 95.5%



Skillzone

- Skillzone Team are also project leaders in European MASS Project (Measuring and Assessing Soft Skills)
- International partners Sweden, Greece, Hungary and the Netherlands.
- Local partners in delivery Schools, CLD and Youth Agencies
- Acknowledged as sector leading practice by HMIe and shortlisted for other awards.
