


What is a good home learning environment?

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The importance of relationship




"When parents provide warm, loving attention, this builds future capacity for empathy and self-control, both of which have a major impact on later life."



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Reinforcing parents' importance

- Parents lack confidence, knowledge and skills, not interest
- What parents do is more important than who they are
- Parental involvement in children's learning through play in the early years has a greater impact on children's wellbeing and achievement than any other factor.

Helping parents see the value of play

I couldn't see the point of doing the same thing over and over again with my toddler.

Then I joined a Dads' group and the worker said "Well actually with repeating this activity which is probably boring you to tears, you're actually reinforcing the connections in your toddler's brain and then it grows..."

That's really good. So now I can see the point and know that what I'm doing is actually making a difference and is important.





Messages from parents

Parents want to be:

- treated as active participants in their children's learning
- listened to and treated with respect
- helped by 'professional friends' practitioners who are well-informed and show an interest in them and their lives
- given clear information and advice
- supported to build their confidence and skills in providing positive early learning experiences
- included in fun activities with their children and other parents







"Effective early childhood settings involve parents in decisions about their child's learning, encourage them to join in activities with their child and share child-related information between parents and staff"

What helps



- Home visits
- Transition sessions and parent discussion groups
- Parent resource rooms
- Resources e.g. lending toys and books, providing laundry and IT facilities
- Fun activities and learning with child
