What is the full core offer?

- Required services identified in previous guidance from DCSF
- Validated in partnership between TfC and the local authority and children's centre-recorded on Tracker by TfC.
- The process will be owned by the local authority in future.

Key services:

- Integrated education and childcare (varies according to centre type)
- Childminder support
- Family support and parental outreach
- Child and family health
- Parental involvement
- Employment support



National Overview

- Before April 2010 TfC was commissioned by DCSF to work with local authorities in supporting and validating "full core offer "status, with support of a checklist developed from previous guidance and "a visit".
- The expectation was that all phase 1 and 2 centres would have achieved this status within two years of designation, and by the end of March 2010.
- Current position
- 3,633 designated Sure Start Children's centres nationally
- 2,846 have reached full core offer
- 19 local authorities have completed their designations and Full core offers-the remainder expected by the end of March 2012
- Local authorities will be expected to self validate their own centres and have improvement arrangements in place to support quality and impact.

National Overview (cont)

- In the light of the legislation and statutory guidance local authorities are required by the Act to" make sufficient provision" of children's centres and services to meet local need.
- "Local need" refers to the need of parents, prospective parents and children under five.
- "Sufficiency" should be determined with local strategic partners and in consultation with users and other community partners.
- There is a presumption against closure.
- The Childcare Act also places a duty upon Ofsted to inspect children's centres, the process will be outcomes-focused and look for evidence of the impact of services on children's outcomes.
- Determination of what full core offer should look like will need to take account of this guidance



National Overview cont.

- The new coalition objectives and the CSR will also impact on what the children's centres will offer, for example-
- Still an emphasis on universal coverage but ensuring the "neediest children and families "are targeted and reached."
- Working with community and voluntary sector organisations who have a "track record" in reaching the most disadvantaged is also a priority.
- The importance of community engagement and local accountability are also important aspects of children's centre governance and development
- The consultation process will also help support further thinking around children's centre services and may impact on interpretation of "full core offer"



What are the key challenges to the delivery of full core offer?

- Delays in capital build and finding alternative venues for service delivery
- Engagement with Health partners and lack of integrated working
- Engagement with JobCentre plus
- Underdeveloped Childminder engagement
- Qualified Teacher input-availability and affordability
- Limited alignment with social care and other family support partners
- Weak links with schools and providers of EYFS
- Sustainability of services in more affluent and rural areas
