



















The ebook situation of 2011 Is the ejournal history repeating? No - very different set ups! Differences from a student perspective, e.g. article is easy to browse and read on the screen printing an article is no big problem Differences from a academic library perspective, e.g. license models for ejournals are very equal formats and rights are equal as well (pdf/html/download) limited market for academic ejournals





Amazon: selling more e- than p-books!

US: 105 ebooks for every 100 pbooks


G.dk: Sales growing fast (Spring 3 % - Summer 13 %)

US market: Two years ago it was 2 % - now it is 20%

EBOOK BAROMETER 2011 Danish Research Libraries Association (DF)

Testimonies from the largest university and college libraries

- Ebooks in general are well accepted by the users
- 5 % increase in 2011 budgets for ebooks
- Put it in the catalogue, blend it with printed books
- Lower print book acquisition due to ebooks (in 50 % of the libraries)

"We try to reduce the purchase of paper books from Springer where we bought the entire portfolio in English. But on the other hand, we buy books in paper when we have access only from Ebrary since their DRM makes it difficult for users to use the book in full."



2010: 328.000 (download) vs 146.000 (loan)


P-collection shrinking


2008-2010:

Netto minus 13.000-15.000 copies per year (5%)















Considerations

- Marc records for catalogue?


