Our brief for Camden Local NHS

- Maternity Health Needs Assessment
- Gain detailed understanding of maternity service provided to women/their partners
- Compare with/contrast against Maternity Matters
- Ensure harder-to-reach groups were included
- Identify issues, not solutions these need local ownership



Approach / methods

- Literature review: filling in the gaps, not reinventing the wheel
- Demographic profiling
- Service mapping
- Protocols / written information evaluation
- Interviews with service users, key informants, service providers
- (Statistical analysis of hospital data)



Choice of place of birth: Maternity Matters

"Depending on their circumstances, women and their partners will be able to choose where they wish to give birth ... The options ... are:

Birth ... at home

Birth ... at a local midwifery facility

Birth ... in a hospital"



Choice of place of birth: assessing the local situation

- Are all three options available?
- What written/verbal information/messages are given out and by whom?
- When are women expected to decide?
- How do providers at all levels feel about home birth?
- How is pregnancy risk-assessed?
- Ask women <u>what happened</u>, not just whether they had a choice ("I had a choice. The doctor said the hospitals they expected people to go to were X or Y")



Choice of place of birth: opportunities identified

- Joint clinics/home birth service
- Independent midwives
- Learning from other trusts
- Potential for saving money after initial investment



Choice of place of birth: challenges identified

- Perception that hospital is always safest
- Home birth is rare so difficult for all midwives to become expert
- Increasing 'choice' for high-risk women (e.g. environment in labour ward)



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
