International rankings and collaborative behaviour

Positive:

Internationally agreed benchmarking enables institutions to 'look up' the status of a potential partner

Openly available and clearly defined criteria can provide information about potential synergies between collaborators



Negative:

An overall institutional ranking may mask individual discipline strengths (particularly in the Arts and Humanities)

'Halo' effects may encourage collaborations that cluster in a group of similarly ranked institutions; may put brake on cross-border capacity building in risk-averse higher ranked institutions

Current international rankings a help or hindrance?



Criteria to promote teaching collaborations

- Institutional self-evaluation who do they aim to teach, and why?
- Capture indicative data around teaching and learning, for instance:
 - ➤ Staff student ratios, infrastructure for teaching, number and nature of existing collaborations, profile of teaching staff, graduate employment statistics, evidence of professional development of teaching, student feedback on teaching
- Notion of 'best for...' rather than 'best'

Caveats re intercultural issues

- How feasible are culturally neutral definitions of teaching quality?
 - My autonomy is your abdication of teaching responsibilities
 - Your powerful memorisation skills are my mere regurgitation of facts
- Possible to work out a core of values?

And finally, a balance is required between

- Desire for an authoritative statement of universally agreed values and ...
