

In 1902 the female inspector found

... a particularly unsavoury case, owing to the vermin infesting the children's heads, in addition to the filth of the whole place. The kitchen ... was occupied for all purposes by two old and invalid sisters, the dissipated son of one of them and his feeble-minded wife and three children. There was one bed, those who could not find a place at night on this filthy and uncomfortable couch 'slept anywhere'; the feeble-minded wife has made no attempt to inculcate habits of elementary decency in the children; the husband drinks and ill uses her; and food appears to be an infrequent item in the daily programme ... The one bedroom of the cottage was allotted to the brother of the occupier and in this I found four dogs and several birds; the atmosphere of the whole house was pestilential.


