The direction was set...

- Government approach based on:
 - 1. Ensuring a focus on **child development**;
 - 2. Recognising **parents and families** need to be at the heart of foundation years services;
 - 3. Promoting effective and evidence-based early intervention;
 - 4. Working to improve the quality of the workforce; and
 - 5. Establishing a **new relationship** between central government, commissioners and providers.
- Significant further progress has been made



Delivering a new EYFS

- Dame Clare Tickell's review concluded:
 - EYFS has had a positive impact, supported increased professionalism and helped to raise standards.
 - It should be retained as a universal, integrated framework, to enable the sector to sustain its momentum in driving-up quality
 - But it needs to be simplified and made more accessible.
 - Reduce early learning goals from 69 to 17
 - Three prime areas of learning: personal social and emotional development; communication and language; and physical development
 - Four specific areas of learning, where the skills are applied: literacy, mathematics, expressive arts and design, and understanding the world
 - Reduce unnecessary bureaucracy more time interacting with children



Government response...

- Welcomed Dame Clare's recommendations, consultation during the summer attracted 2,300 responses and Government responded in December:
- Key issues:
 - School Readiness should be understood in a broad sense. It is all the things that children learn in the EYFS: listening, speaking and communicating, building relationships with other children and adults, play, good health and physical development are <u>all</u> key elements of school readiness.
 - Assessment at age 5 must be relevant to all children, including those with Special Educational Needs.
 - We remain convinced of the need for a slimmed down <u>statutory</u> framework.
 <u>Additional information and guidance</u> will be available to support practitioners.
 We are working closely with sector bodies to develop this.
- Further consultation on learning and development goals: we have looked again at literacy and maths.



Free entitlement to early education

- Ongoing consultation on revised guidance on the free entitlement (and childcare for those aged over 5):
 - Streamlined statutory guidance reduced from over 100 pages to 20
 - Greater flexibility in the free entitlement (7am to 7pm, rather than 8 am to 6pm and over a minimum of two days per week rather than three) but not mandatory for providers;
 - A new basket of quality criteria to receive funding (at a minimum must be satisfactory if one or more other criteria are also met); and
 - No requirement for a three yearly sufficiency assessment: annual report to parents and elected Members in a format which meets local need.
- Consultation continues but will need to consult again on extended entitlement for two year olds.



Extension of free entitlement for two year olds

- Already planning to improve access to early education for children from disadvantaged backgrounds, narrowing the gaps in achievement so that 20% of two year olds would benefit:
 - Mirroring the free school meals criteria a single, national measure of economic disadvantage;
 - Looked after children;
 - Option for local authorities to offer places to other groups
- Chancellor of Exchequer announced a further extension to cover around 260,000 children.
- Existing consultation stands but will consult again on this extended eligibility.



Qualifications Review – Professor Cathy Nutbrown

- An independent review looking at how to: :
 - Create a high-qualified, skilled, knowledgeable and professional workforce.
 - Ensure practitioners are child and family centred, as well as confident and ready to work with families.
 - Strengthen qualifications and career pathways for this workforce.
- Call for evidence published end of October, supported by consultation events around the country.
- The final report is expected to be published in summer 2012.



Next steps and challenges

- Consultation on free entitlement closes 3 February.
- Aim to publish a revised EYFS later in the spring for implementation from autumn 2012.
- Aligning inspection regime with the EYFS Ofsted consultation close 6 April.
- Qualifications review call for evidence closes 23 January.
- Further consultation on extended entitlement for two-year olds in due course.
- Delivery challenges ahead:
 - How do we build capacity for the extended free early education entitlement?
 - How can settings get ready for implementing the new EYFS this autumn?
