provision of childcare and early learning

- 17,600 full day care providers, 948,000 children
- 7,900 sessional providers
- 48,800 active childminders
- 15,700 maintained schools – including 400 nursery schools
- 550 Sure Start Children's Centres offering full day care, 38,400 children (down from 800 in 2010 and a peak of 1,000 in 2009)

matching provision to need

- 462,500 vacancies across all types of provider
- 134,600 vacancies in full day care
- Vacancies in all types of area - 27% of vacancies in the 30% most deprived areas
- 70% of children's centres offering full day care in the 30%, with total 3,000 vacancies
- 26% of day care in the 30% = 4,400 settings with 38,400 vacancies

demographic pressures

- Significant growth over the next decade
- Increasing poverty – more two year old children eligible for free places?
- The gap – 1,000s of places needed!

partnership working

- Choice for parents – all quality providers should be involved
- Promotion – nationally and locally
- Signposting and referrals – SSCCs to day care and vice versa
- Ease of access – eligibility checks at all providers?

providing integrated support

NDNA survey on the two year old offer, Spring 2012

- Want to get involved if the conditions are right
- Need for correct funding for quality
- Wider support to children and families – partnership working essential to meet all the child's and family's needs

top five challenges for employers

- Increasing wages
